Yadkin River Nature Trail

The Yadkin River Nature Trail at Tanglewood Park officially opens on June 10 with a ceremony for local officials and other invited guests. Development of the trail has been a collaborative effort between Forsyth Audubon and the park. The trail is in the area between the river and the BMX road – now designated as Audubon Trail.

After Working together on a native warm season grass restoration project, the County asked Forsyth Audubon to create signage for a nature trail. The chapter secured funding and designed the educational signs. Twelve signs now welcome visitors in the southwest corner of the park. This area includes geographical features like the native grassland and an oxbow that support a diversity of wildlife from frogs to butterflies to hawks and owls. Funding was provided by US Fish and Wildlife Service, Duke Energy and Pilot View Inc./Resource Institute.

Forsyth Audubon will offer guided nature walks to celebrate the opening of the trail on June 14 and June 21 at 9 AM and 11 AM each day.

Spring Trip to Monterey, Virginia

Twenty-three members just returned from our spring trip to Virginia's Bath and Highland counties. The birding began at Warbler Rd. north of Roanoke. Later stops included Hidden Valley, Paddy Knob and Blue Grass Valley.

Cerulean, Mourning and Golden-winged Warblers were life birds for several in the group. Blackburnian Warblers, Rose-breasted Grosbeaks, Yellow-billed Cuckoos and Black-capped Chickadees also were among the nearly 100 species tallied by the group.

Wood Thrush Recapture

Last year, we captured and attached GPS locator tags to 22 male Wood Thrushes at Pilot Mountain State Park and Historic Bethabara. Currently, Tim Guida, a field biologist from the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center, is here trying to recapture some of those birds to collect the data from the tags.

On May 25, Tim netted a tagged bird that had spent the winter in Belize. When five chapter members traveled to there in January 2014, everyone hoped that some Belize thrushes also would be "our" birds. Our travelers did not visit the precise area where the tagged bird wintered, but they were pretty close.

Trapping continues through June 7 and possibly later. The goal is to use collected data to guide habitat conservation efforts. The chapter also will consider how best to continue our relationship with Belize Audubon on behalf of these birds and other neotropical migrants.
