Winter Trip Goes to Virginia Tidewater

If you were on your own, you would have little opportunity to see the winter birds of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge/Tunnel and Mackay Island NWR. Our winter trip, January 17-20, will take you there, plus possible stops at Kiptokete State Par and Back Bay NWR in Virginia. Birding the Bridge/Tunnel can be special, with such species as Harlequin Duck, the three Scoters, Brants and Great Cormorants. And, Mackay has several Rail species.

Birding the Bridge/Tunnel requires special reservations and a fee payment (plus \$18 toll), so please contact Rob Rogers at rrogers10@triad.rr.com, no later than December 1, if you want to go. Look for coming details about Virginia Beach accommodations.

Hawk Identification Guide

How are your hawk identification skills? If you are a veteran migration counter at Pilot Mountain, you probably confident, but where does that leave the rest of us? I missed this fall

migration period, so on a lark I purchased a new book to study. *The Crossley ID Guide Raptors* by Crossley, Liguori and Sullivan was more than I thought it would be. The raptor guide dedicates a page of well-positioned photos of adults, a page for juveniles, followed by a page of quiz birds. The backgrounds are photos of appropriate habitats. Accipiters also have multiple quiz pages of mixed accipiters, as if you were at a hawk watch. The Red-tailed has 6 pages of information and 2 quiz pages on eastern, western, Krider's and Harlan's Hawks. The back of the book has an easy-reading write-up of each species. Nothing substitutes for field experience, but this book definitely prepares you to help our hawk watchers – "Hop" Hopkins.

Remembering Our Extinct Birds

On November 26, our chapter meeting features "The Lost Bird Project." Gone are the Carolina Parakeet, Passenger Pigeon and other North American Birds, but Todd McGrain searches to install large bronze sculptures at locations where they last were seen. Socializing begins at 7 p.m. and the program at 7:30 at the Historic Bethabara Visitor's Center, 2147 Bethabara Rd.
