

Don Lendle wins Snavely Award

chapter founder and matriarch Ramona Snavely, was instituted in 2007. At our Christmas Bird Count Dinner on December 30th, Forsyth Audubon president Chris Marsh presented the Ramona Snavely award to Don Lendle.

Don served as Chapter President of Forsyth Audubon for three years. But that really doesn't tell the story of all that he does. He is always willing to offer to lead bird outings, attends Advocacy Days in Raleigh, he can be counted on to join our Clean and Green clean-ups of the Bethabara Wetlands, and does so many other things "behind the scenes" to help our organization, help the environment, and help the birds. He led the effort with Habitat for Humanity to plant native plants at their Education Complex, including a rain garden, and native plant landscaping for Habitat houses. While he was chapter president he created the Advocacy Committee and recruited our first Advocacy Chair, and created the EDIB Committee (Equity Diversity Inclusion and Belonging) and recruited our first EDIB Chair. He kept our "flock" together during Covid, when we weren't able to meet in person, or even have bird outings. He gently, yet persistently introduced the rest of the board to the wonders and frustrations of a "Zoom Meeting." Don continues to make our organization stronger by his quiet good works.




New Meeting Location

Our Book Club meets on Zoom the 3rd Sunday of the month at 4:00 PM. Email Hannah Addair for the Zoom link.



Tuesday, January 9 - 10:00 AM - Botany Outing - Bethania Black Walnut Bottoms - meet plant expert Lisa Gould in the parking lot of the Bethania Visitor Center and walk along the Bethania Black Walnut Bottom Trail looking for winter plants of interest.

Saturday, January 13 - 8:30 AM - Second Saturday Bird Outing - Washington Park - Leader Dr. Saubhagya Silwal will meet us in the parking lot of Washington Park off Broad Street.

Saturday, January 20 - 9:30 AM - (note later start time) Young Birders Outing - Salem Lake Linville Road Entrance -please dress warmly, layers work well, and wear closed-toe sturdy shoes.
