

Please join us May 28th to hear from author Dr. Elizabeth Hilborn.



When her North Carolina farm was damaged by toxic chemicals — a combination of insecticides, fungicides, and herbicides, including glyphosate,


new memoir, narrates this experience, stating that "In the natural world, going out with a sense of curiosity really helps." It is curiosity that led her to investigate the causes of the damage to her farm. She says that the type of damage that her family was dealt is reversible, but consumers need to be educated about their options and the power of their money. "I hope that I left space for hope," Hilborn said. "All of this is under our control."
